# Building Capacity

## 2016 Initiatives

With continued and focused effort to build capacity, to operate effectively, and to establish long term sustainability, the Friends made significant advancements in many areas of governance and program development.

### ***Board Member Recruitment***

With three vacant board seats, the Board Development Committee set out this year to search for prospective board members. Their efforts were successful. New, incoming Directors will be seated in January and March of 2017, thus filling all board seats.

### ***Board Development***

Effective governance, fundraising, and donor relations are critical to the long term sustainability of the Friends. As such, Board members and the Executive Director took part in professional development activities geared to build leadership and foster best practices in non-profit governance.

### ***Community Outreach***

This year, the Friends attended each of the Forest Preserve's facility-based events including Musher Mania, the Earth, Wind and Fire Festival, Island Rendezvous, Art & Nature on the River, and the Goodenow Grove Fall Festival in an effort to expand awareness and build relationships.

### ***Social Media & Website Development***

In 2016, the Friends launched its presence on Facebook. The Friends also continued to enhance its website and on-line donation capabilities through its unique partnership with Flipcause, a non-profit fundraising technology provider.

## 2016 Initiatives

### ***Bringing Nature Home Native Plant Sale and Pre-Sale Event***

A huge success, 700 visitors came to the the Native Plant Sale and Pre-Sale event and purchased over 5,000 native plants! For the first time ever, the Pre-Sale Event was a ticketed, fundraising event that drew almost 100 attendees.

### ***Help Keep Nature Education Programs Free***

Launched in December 2015, this initiative marked the Friends' first ever fundraising campaign. The campaign which raised funds for the Forest Preserve to purchase equipment, supplies and materials for nature study continued into 2016 and the \$5,000 fundraising goal was met by individual donations and proceeds from the Native Plant Sale.

### ***Restore Will County***

This new initiative seeks to provide small grants to the Forest Preserve's Volunteer Stewards to help them purchase the supplies, materials and equipment they need to conduct much needed natural area restoration work in many forest preserves. The campaign launched in November and the Friends successfully reached and exceeded its goal of \$7,000 by the end of the year!

# IN FOCUS

## Bringing Nature Home Native Plant Sale

Held in May at the Sugar Creek Administration Center in Joliet, this year's event featured two major improvements. First, the event was moved from the parking lot to the plaza at the front of the administration center's main entrance and featured a connected tunnel of tents that spanned the plaza and paved trail. Second, the Friday night Pre-Sale Event and Reception was a ticketed, fundraising event with music, boutique wine, craft beer, a selection of artisan cheeses and sausages, as well as gourmet desserts, and the opportunity to purchase native plants early. Tickets were sold for \$20 each and 85 people purchased tickets. Proceeds from this event helped the Friends meet its \$5,000 goal in support of the "Help Keep Nature Education Programs Free" campaign.

Restoring native plant habitat is vital to preserving biodiversity. By creating a native plant garden, each patch of habitat becomes part of a collective effort to nurture and sustain the living landscape for birds and other animals. That is why this event is so much more than a sale. In addition to purchasing native plants, visitors learn about more about native landscaping, talk with native plant experts about landscape and garden design and plant selection, learn about conservation efforts for the Monarch and other pollinators of concern, and meet others who share their passion for sound conservation practices and gardening.

This year's presentations included "Conservation@ Home" with Jim Kleinwachter of The Conservation Foundation, "Nuances of the Monarch" with Nancy Kuhajda of Illinois Master Gardeners, and "From the Ground Up!! and Native Plant Q&A" with Connor Shaw of Possibility Place Nursery.

Exhibitors included Friends of the Forest Preserve District of Will County, Forest Preserve District of Will County, The Conservation Foundation, Land Conservancy of Will County, Garden Clubs of Illinois – Milkweed for Monarchs Campaign, Illinois Native Plant Society, Wild Ones of Will County, Will County Audubon Society, University of Illinois Extension – Illinois Master Gardeners, Illinois Natural History Survey – Traveling Science Center, and Mike MacDonald Photography.

# IN FOCUS

## Help Keep Nature Education Programs Free!

Each year the Forest Preserve District of Will County provides nature education programs to more than 15,000 public school students. However, due to participation costs, there are still many students who are unable to take part in these programs. In an effort to reduce barriers and increase participation, the Forest Preserve District's Board of Commissioners eliminated field trip fees in 2016 for students; these fees helped to offset the District's costs of materials and equipment for its nature education programs.

In December 2015, the Friends launched its first-ever fundraising campaign, the "Help Keep Nature Education Programs Free!" campaign with the hopes of raising \$5,000 to assist the District in purchasing the necessary equipment, supplies and materials to help students discover local ponds and streams, learn about forest ecology, participate in direct experiences with nature, and become better stewards of our natural areas while keeping programs free.

With the help of individual donors and native plant enthusiasts, the Friends reached its campaign goal of \$5,000 following its Bringing Nature Home Native Plant Sale and Friday Night Pre-Sale Reception in May 2016.

The Friends presented the Forest Preserve District with a \$5,000 check at its September Board meeting in time for the upcoming school year and the Forest Preserve's 2017 budget planning.

Also in September, the Friends received a generous donation from Ducere, LLC in support of two Friends initiatives: nature education for children and a new land stewardship initiative that was to launch in November. Half of the \$6,000 donation will be used for the Help Keep Nature Programs Free initiative in 2017.

# IN FOCUS

## Restore Will County Land Stewardship Small Grants Program

Restore Will County is a small grants program that supports Forest Preserve District volunteers and their commitment to land stewardship. Passionate and purposeful in their work, volunteer stewards adopt a forest preserve, often within their own community, and set out to collect and distribute seed from native plants, cut brush, and control non-native weeds so that our native plants and animals have a chance to thrive. They work to restore the land and re-establish the natural ecological relationships.

The Restore Will County Small Grants Program provides financial assistance to stewards to help them purchase what they need. Whether it be in the form of plant material, seed, personal protective equipment, herbicide, small tools or supplies to aid in monitoring activities, or organizing a community workday; these small grants can have a lasting impact on volunteers and our natural areas.

With a goal of \$7,000, the Restore Will County campaign officially launched on #GivingTuesday, November 29, 2016. The Friends kicked off the campaign by announcing two significant donations it had already received: \$3,000 from Ducere, LLC (with the other \$3,000 for nature education programs) and \$2,000 from an anonymous donor with a match challenge to raise an additional \$2,000 through individual donations by December 31, 2016. By the end of the campaign the Friends had met the match challenge and raised over \$2,000 from individual donors making the grand total just over \$7,600 for the Restore Will County Small Grants Program!

In 2016, a dedicated group of 13 volunteer stewards donated over 3,200 hours taking care of the natural landscapes and plants and animals we all enjoy.

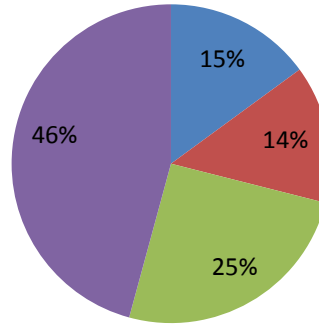

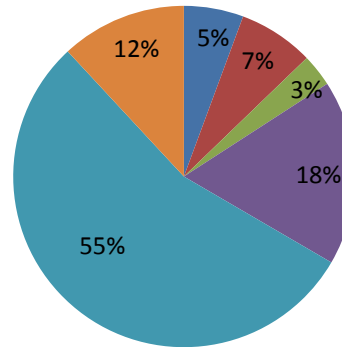
